| After School Clubs It was decided that there will be a rolling timetable across the year of different clubs to give all children access to a variety of clubs. We have been able to respond to parent comments and children's needs by adding these new clubs. | One key area of improvement would be the addition of lighting the caged sports area. We currently have a tennis club on a Monday which is timetabled to continue throughout the year. In the winter months it has to go inside to the hall due to bad light. Lighting would enable us to hold this club outside all year round and have winter netball tournaments as well. We are looking at options, although we are finding this expensive. Therefore, we are planning to action this in 2018 - 2019 by using funding over two academic years to pay for this. |
| Continued support and training for staff to support the teaching of consistently 'good' and 'outstanding' lessons. 'GT Centre of Sport', headed by Gurdip Thind is again supporting staff by providing at the point of teaching CPD. Each teacher is timetabled to have a full term of support over the year. Gurdip is teaching a full unit to a class with the class teacher observing and team teaching. During a second session at the end of the year, each teacher will be able to team teach. The teacher will be observed by Gurdip. During the school year the PE and Sport Subject Leader will carry out lesson observations supported by the HT or DHT. | Teaching of 'good' and 'outstanding' lessons will be evidenced through monitoring and observations which will take place throughout the school year. The impact of this CPD will be most evident next academic year when the class teachers will have covered a wide range of PE units to build their knowledge, understanding and skillset in teaching PE across a wide range of key areas. |
| Collaboration (4 schools) We have held meetings with the PE Subject Leaders of our collaboration, to discuss assessment and progression of skills. A new skills progression document was produced along with agreeing the continued use of the assessment document from C2C sports SOW. We have been supplied with an alternative assessment document but have decided to continue using the C2C document 2017 - 18 and review this at the end of the academic year.
